## By the Numbers: What We Know about Teacher Quality in Philadelphia

Philadelphia schools will not be able to improve student performance dramatically without more teachers who have the skills, experience, and rich content knowledge needed to help every student achieve at high levels. A new report, Once \& For All: Placing a Highly Qualified Teacher in Every Philadelphia Classroom, identifies a number of important indicators related to teacher quality.
